# Most of Surrey moves to Tier 3 Level

It has been announced today that from Saturday 19th December, the majority of Surrey will be placed into tier 3, the **Very High Covid Alert Level**. Waverley is to remain in tier 2. Due to rapidly rising rates of Coronavirus across most of Surrey the Government has taken the decision to implement tier 3 restrictions in all other districts and boroughs.

The Very High alert level is for areas with a very high or very rapidly rising level of infections, where tighter restrictions are required. The decision to move an area into a higher tier is based on a number of indicators, including the overall infection rate, the rate in the over 60s, and the pressure on the NHS.

This means that, with the exception of Waverley, if you live in Surrey:

- You can only mix households (in groups of up to six) in outdoor spaces, such as parks and the countryside, not in private gardens
- All hospitality venues such as bars, pubs and cafés must shut. They can open for takeaway only
- Indoor entertainment venues, such as theatres and cinemas, must close
- Accommodation, such as hotels and B&Bs, must close.

This is in addition to existing guidelines that state you must not mix with anyone you don't live with (or who aren't in your support bubble) in any indoor setting.

Residents in Waverley should continue to follow tier 2 rules.

Residents in tier 3 should avoid travelling outside their area including for overnight stays, other than where necessary, such as for work, education or medical treatment. They should also continue to follow tier 3 rules if they travel to an area in a lower tier and must not stay with anyone they do not live with elsewhere in the UK, or visit their home (unless they share a support bubble).

Everyone in Surrey should continue to follow guidance on wearing face coverings, social distancing, and working from home when possible. If you can't work from home you should walk or cycle where possible, or try to avoid busy times on public transport.

# Mass vaccination programme begins in Surrey

Vaccinations against COVID-19 began in Surrey last week at the Royal Surrey NHS Foundation Trust in Guildford, one of the first 50 hospital hubs to receive the vaccine.

It is initially immunising care home workers, staff who are at risk, and people over the age of 80 who are Royal Surrey outpatients, contacted in advance of their scheduled appointments.

The Trust is also working with care home providers to book their staff into vaccination clinics. In the first six days just over 1,600 vaccines were given.

The first local vaccination services (based on primary care network (PCN) groupings) began at the following sites on 16 December:

- Epsom Racecourse, Epsom
- Chertsey Hall, Chertsey
- The Westway, Caterham
- St Christopher's Church, Haslemere.

The public has an important part to play to help the NHS expand this programme and to deliver it effectively. The message to our residents is:

- Please don't contact the NHS to seek a vaccine, they will contact you;
- When contacted, please attend your booked appointments;
- And please continue to follow all the guidance to control the virus and save lives.

# Support available for Surrey families struggling this winter

Surrey County Council will ensure help is available for families struggling this winter, through the Government's £170m COVID Winter Support Grant of which Surrey is set to receive just over £2m.

It is designed to directly help families and individuals who have been hardest hit by the pandemic, with the majority set aside to ensure children do not go hungry during the winter months.

Around £200,000 from the first tranche of money will be given to the <u>Surrey Crisis Fund</u> and made available to residents who are struggling through the winter. This money will provide support towards food costs and utility bills, but also emergencies such as replacing broken white goods and to guide people away from long lasting debt.

# Locally Supported Contact Tracing

Surrey County Council is supporting the national Test and Trace programme by contacting residents in the county who have tested positive for COVID-19. If the national Test and Trace service is unable to contact someone within 24 hours, their details will be referred to Surrey's contact tracing team. The only number the team will call residents from is 01483 404939.

Surrey already has a strong contact tracing completion rate through the national Test and Trace service. - Closed between Friday 1 January until Sunday 3 January.

The Community Helpline can help in two ways:

- 1. To help direct residents who need support if friends or family are unable to help with such things as picking up shopping, prescription collections or having someone who can be a telephone friend, and to other services that can help.
- 2. To provide advice on where to register an offer of help to support the community.

# Pandemic delivery service

The pandemic delivery service helped clinically extremely vulnerable patients self-isolating at home get their medicines. Information about the end of the pandemic medicine delivery service, future reactivation of the service and current requests for home deliveries of prescribed medicines is available for professionals and public sharing at <u>Community Pharmacy Surrey and Sussex</u>.

The national <u>Thriving Communities Fund</u> has been made possible by National Academy for Social Prescribing (providing £1.15 million) and the Arts Council (providing £250,000). The initiative also includes NHS England, Sport England, Natural England, the Office for Civil Society, the Money & Pensions Service and NHS Charities Together as strategic partners. This funding is designed to increase social connectedness and help communities cope with the impact of COVID-19.

# **BP+ Service resumes**

Pharmacies in Surrey have once again been offering valuable BP+ checks to residents, with the aim of finding those with high blood pressure or atrial fibrillation (AF). Since the start of October, over 400 BP+ checks have been completed and over 80 people have been identified with high blood pressure readings.

COVID-19 has highlighted the need to address health inequalities and cardiovascular disease, as this is one of the illnesses most strongly linked with health inequality. Furthermore, high blood pressure is one of several conditions associated with an increased risk of more severe COVID-19 symptoms and it is something that often has no symptoms. The only way to know if you have high blood pressure is to have it checked.

# Action for Carers Surrey: supporting carers aged 5-95

Carers remain one of the groups most badly affected by the pandemic – with increased isolation and stress making a difficult role even harder. However <u>Action for Carers</u> has expanded its offer and continues to provide <u>vital support</u> to this vulnerable group, including:

- Face to face and telephone support, for information, advice, and signposting.
- A huge range of Zoom events (and face to face where possible) from support groups, training and information, to wellbeing and relaxation sessions, giving carers time out from their caring role. Currently running over 45 free events a month.
- Benefits advice, including help with completing forms.
- A dedicated team providing moving and handling advice and training, helping carers look after their backs.
- Advocacy and information on rights as a carer.
- Carer Advisors in Surrey's five main hospitals giving advice, information and emotional support, and aiding communication between the carer and the hospital.
- Consultations and other opportunities to influence change for carers, locally and nationally.
- <u>Specialist support for key groups</u>:

- Certain groups of carers, e.g. parent carers, or carers for people with mental health difficulties.
- > Carers connected to the Armed forces.
- Young Adult Carers (YAC) the YAC service helps those aged 18-24 achieve a balance between their caring role and growing independence. Support includes social activities, information events, help with education, money management and more.
- For carers under 18, the Surrey Young Carers service offers drop-ins, forums, activities and groups to give young carers support, and time out from caring. Also there are dedicated staff working in Surrey's schools.

# Reminder that Surrey carers are invited to have their say on the support they need

Surrey County Council and local NHS organisations have produced a draft three-year <u>carers' strategy</u> which sets out how services will support carers' health and wellbeing and improve their lives.

The strategy sets out the values and priorities which will underpin support for carers in Surrey and also details a number of specific commitments.

Carers have until 3 January 2021 to complete a short <u>survey</u> about the draft strategy on Surrey Says. Hard copies can be printed and accessible versions of the survey including Easy Read are also available. A wider programme of engagement is underway to hear people's views.

- **Space2Grow**, Intergenerational project to develop life skills and reduce loneliness for people with mental ill health in Farnham;
- Stoke Community Support, COVID response project to provide meals and support for economically deprived families impacted by COVID in Stoke;
- **Chertsey Good Neighbours**, Project to support the elderly and vulnerable through a range of provisions to reduce loneliness in Chertsey and Addlestone;
- **Be My Hope**, Project to support disadvantaged BME communities through a virtual and telephone based service to improve mental health and wellbeing in Surrey;
- **Camberley Nepalese (Gurkha) Society**, Project to support elderly Gurkha veterans through provision of weekly activities to reduce loneliness and improve mental wellbeing in Camberley;
- **Christmas Day at the Greeno**, Project to support the isolated elderly and carers through provision of 'festive bags' and phone calls on Christmas to reduce isolation in Shepperton;
- **Dorking Men's Shed**, Project to develop 'older men's life skills' programme to improve mental health and wellbeing of older men suffering from isolation in Dorking;
- **Weybridge Men's Shed**, Project to launch a new Men's Shed to improve mental health and wellbeing of older men suffering from isolation in Weybridge;
- Intergenerational Music Making, Intergenerational project to provide music and singing sessions for people with poor mental health and suffering from social isolation in Surrey.

It is hoped this will act as a launch pad for ongoing collaboration with communities where they can co-design and co-produce community support. As a result, the county council want to empower active communities who are able to offer an increased range of community support which can help people live independently for longer.

# Surrey Wins Millions to Keep Homes Warm and Lower Energy Bills

£6.2 million has been made available to help 600 Surrey households save money on their energy bills.

The funding for "Green Jump Surrey" has been awarded through central Government to local authorities across the county and will provide eligible households up to £10,000 to improve the energy efficiency of their homes.

In addition to the Government's grant, Surrey County Council is contributing £750,000 to the "Green Jump Surrey" project as top-up funding to cover the full cost of works.

People living in a hard-to-heat home and either in receipt of a means tested benefit or have a total gross annual household income of less than £30,000, could be eligible for funding.
