Cases of COVID -19 are rising in Surrey

Cases are rising across the county with more than 12,000 new cases reported in the last seven days, meaning a rise of 23% in new cases compared to the previous week.

There are still steps you can take to reduce the risk of catching and spreading COVID-19:

- Get vaccinated
- · Let fresh air in if meeting indoors, or meet outside
- Consider wearing a face covering in crowded, enclosed spaces
- Get tested if you have COVID-19 symptoms, and stay at home if positive.

Surrey County Council's weekly <u>short figures summary</u> gives a high-level snapshot of coronavirus infection rates and vaccination uptake for all districts and boroughs across Surrey. It also provides information on people admitted to hospital with Covid-19 across the South East region.

A spring booster of the COVID-19 vaccine is available to people aged 75 and over, people who live in a care home for older people, or people aged 12 and over who have a weakened immune system.

Review of the Accessible Information Standard published

All organisations that provide NHS care and/or publicly-funded adult social care are legally required to follow the <u>Accessible Information Standard</u> (AIS). The standard sets out a specific, consistent approach to identifying, recording, flagging, sharing and meeting the information and communication support needs of patients, service users, carers and parents with a disability, impairment or sensory loss.

The Deaf health charity, SignHealth, has worked in partnership with a coalition of charities to survey NHS and social care professionals in England, as well as disabled people who have accessible information and communication needs, about the AIS. This survey revealed the following:

After five years of the Accessible Information Standard, only 11% of patients covered by the AIS have equitable access to the NHS.

 35% of professionals reported that their organisation provides regular training linked to the AIS however 37% report training has never occurred.

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- 67% of Deaf people reported that no accessible method of contacting their GP has been made available to them.
- 81% of patients reported having an appointment when their communication needs were unmet.
- 77% of people with accessible information needs reported rarely or never receiving information in alternative formats.
- Only 41% of complaints procedures were reported to be accessible by the professionals who filled in the survey.
- 1 in 3 health and social care providers were unaware or unsure of the existence of the AIS.

The <u>Review of the NHS Accessible Information Standard</u> contains the full findings and highlights the significant actions that must be taken by providers in order to implement the AIS in full.

Additionally, as part of the 'Your Care, Your Way' campaign, Healthwatch England has set out five headline recommendations to help health and care services ensure that people who have communication needs are given their healthcare information in the way they need it.

Local infrastructure support survey launched

Surrey County Council is carrying out a review of how well the needs of Surrey's Voluntary Community and Faith Sector (VCFS) are being met by infrastructure organisations, local Councils for Voluntary Services (CVSs) and others. An infrastructure organisation is one that provides services to other charities and community groups, rather than directly to services users or beneficiaries.

Locality, a national community group support charity, has been commissioned by the council to do an assessment of how infrastructure organisations help organisations how they should offer support in the future. It is a very useful tool to gauge how well they are supporting the sector and meeting its needs and where gaps in service provision lie.

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'Help Us, Help you' cancer campaign launched

NHS England & NHS Improvement have launched a new phase of the 'Help Us, Help You' campaign taking a radically different approach to detecting cancer earlier for patients, when it is easier to treat. The campaign aims to address the barriers to people coming forward early by encouraging those who have noticed something in their body that doesn't feel right and are worried it could be cancer to contact their GP practice. The campaign will reassure people by highlighting that most people who are referred for tests by their GP find out it's not cancer and that finding out sooner is always better.

Dave is currently taking part in a modular firefighter training course. He has been supported through some high-risk exercises to ensure he, and many others like him, can fulfil their dreams of becoming firefighters. The tests were to ensure he is safe and well whilst in extremely hot situations.

Dave said: "I hope this encourages other people who are living with single sided impairment or are part of the diverse and underrepresented community to apply to join blue light services because I am thoroughly looking forward to my new career."

Every 15 minutes in the UK someone is diagnosed with bowel cancer. That's over 42,000 people every year. Every 30 minutes someone dies from the disease in the UK. Bowel cancer is the second biggest cancer killer in the UK claiming more than 16,000 lives a year, that's over 44 people every day. Bowel cancer is the fourth most common cancer in the UK, after breast, prostate and lung cancers.

Surrey Police: Herbert Protocol helps missing people

Surrey Police has been raising awareness of 'missing people' and reminding carers of the importance of the Herbert Protocol. <u>The Herbert Protocol</u> is a form that carers, family or friends of a vulnerable person, or the person themselves can fill in.

It contains a list of information to help the police if the person goes missing, including; medication, mobile numbers, places previously located or lived and a recent photograph.

Keeping a completed form saves the worry of trying to recall the information during the stressful time of someone going missing. It also saves time for the police, allowing the search to start sooner.

New literacy skills project for Gypsy, Roma and Traveller adults

Skills impact tutors can travel anywhere in Surrey and can even support those who reside for only a few weeks and adjust the sessions to accommodate.'
